
The Early Years



The original banner, destroyed in the Coventry Blitz in 1940






- 1918 The new Diocese of Coventry is formed and inaugurated
- 1919 Coventry Diocese Mothers' Union is affiliated to the central Mothers' Union
- 1925 Mary Sumner House built
- 1926 Golden Jubilee of Mothers' Union

- First President Lilian Rice serves from 1918 to 1935
- Alison Winser succeeds her in 1935. Wife of Revd R B Winser

Mrs Rice retired in 1935. Archdeacon's wife Mrs Holland spoke of the great feeling of affection and love which all the members of the Union have for Mrs Rice, for her wonderful gifts of sympathy and understanding and of her deep spiritual influence. Bishop Mervyn George Haigh said, "The Mothers' Union in the Diocese of Coventry is a great power for good."

There were 154 branches and over 3,000 members

Call to Renewal 1933

Launched by the Archbishop of York, William Temple, in June 1933, the Call to Renewal aimed to revitalise the organisation by arousing in members a stronger sense of being a worldwide body united in prayer ... An important component of this experience was, however, the focussing of patriotic love and imperial pride on the motherland of Britain, centred on the recently built headquarters, Mary Sumner House ... The Call to Renewal's timing was significant. It was issued after discussions at Central Council had revealed lukewarm commitment to a policy of total opposition to divorce reform. The need to shore up internal loyalty to the MU's position was reflected in the name of the campaign as well as its motto, "be ye not set to the pattern of this world but be ye transformed!

Wartime Mothers' Union Rising to the Challenge



The EM [Enrolling Member i.e. Branch Leader] then spoke on "The Building of a New England" from the Workers' Paper. The chairman's remarks were based on the importance of worship public and private during these anxious days.... Mrs Gosling and Mrs Kendrick proposed votes of thanks to the Vicar and Mrs Fortescue for giving the Mothers such an enjoyable time. The Rev and Mrs Fortescue in reply said that their intention had been to give the members a few hours of happy relaxation and if this had been achieved, they were content, tho' the bombers overhead would not let them forget the war entirely.

Moving on after the War

- 1946 Mrs E Marjorie Howard, wife of Provost Howard, elected President
- 1946-47 Call to Rededication and Affirmation of Promises

Mrs Bingeman had received a letter from Mrs Howard, the Diocesan President about Evangelism in the MU and hoped we might do something about it in the Parish





Wilmcote Branch April 1960

Edith Hoare (President) and Mrs Greenwell (Secretary) attended the Consecration of the new Coventry Cathedral in 1962. Members had raised £350 for the cost of the Lady Chapel altar. "Each member is to be asked to pay 1/- [5p] towards this – money to be sent in by 1st October [1960]."

Mothers' Union spearheaded a Christian Family Year in 1962, and many Dioceses held special events in conjunction with other family organisations. Canon Eric Patey, a controversial speaker in Coventry, was a keynote speaker, talking about the state of the family, including teenage pregnancy rates, moral decline and its causes, pressures of increased leisure and available cash, and the need for strong leadership from parents. His comments were not universally welcomed. Some members felt he was crude, even un-Christian while others thought he was relevant for the current generation.



At the Deanery Festivals, veils are now worn by those members carrying banners, and it was unanimously passed that we should order these veils @ 5/- [25p] each, to be paid for out of MU funds

Young Families Department

A Young Wives Committee was formed as early as 1916 "to interest twentieth century mothers" but it was disbanded in 1937 after disagreements with the central MU about its views on birth control and divorce!

In 1945 a new Young Members' Department was formed, which included a mission to start up open groups

Just before leaving the Chelmsford Diocese I was asked to form a Combined MU and Young Wives Evening Meeting, which we started with a Beetle drive. Young Wives Committee voted on having this, but MU Enrolling Member disapproved! I'm afraid I was rather a rebel!

Working with young families: some hot topics from 1950s and 1960s

Suggestions for Branch Discussion and Action

Have you a local problem of mothers of young children going out to work? Are the arrangements for their children to be looked after adequate? Do you know how girls are trained at school to look on their possible vocation as wives and mothers?

From Presenting the Mothers' Union c.1955

Contraceptives: nothing is to be done nationally about their sale but it can be taken up locally. The matter of advertisements for contraceptives sent to engaged couples was discussed

Watch and Social Problems Committee 1962

About 28 young women were [at Foleshill], all very nice and friendly, in a pleasant drawing room; two West Indians and one Indian who has married an Englishman. I told them about the MU and how it could help. A shy little Mrs Hunt sitting by me asked how she could tell her son and daughter, teenagers, about sex, as she had never mentioned it to them and had often felt she should as they were beginning to go out with other people. Her husband had never said anything either. She bought one of the booklets.

For the first time

- Women who were divorced could join or remain members
- Unmarried women could join on an equal footing (not as associates)
- Men could join







The New Millennium - Moving Forward

- Journey of Hope a Time Capsule travelled around Britain and Ireland, passing through Coventry
- Two new projects launched from Mary Sumner House for the millennium
 - Literacy and Development Programme overseas
 - Parenting 2000 in the UK and Ireland
- Central Trustee Board included more Trustees from overseas
- Wave of Prayer links were reallocated to include newly formed Dioceses

Parenting

- Coventry hosts the first Facilitator Training Event at Offa House in 2001
- 7 members from Coventry are trained, although only 2 continue to get their accreditation
- Parenting Groups start, the first one in Kenilworth



Passionate Parenting

- Coventry has hosted three further training courses
- Many groups have been run from Kineton to Bedworth and Alcester to Rugby
- Three staff/trustees from Coffee Tots in Coventry are among those trained to deliver groups





What Should We Tell the Children about Relationships and Sex



- In 2004, amid concern at the high number of teenage pregnancies, Coventry City Council commissioned Coventry University to develop a Parenting Programme to help parents talk to their children about relationships and sex
- Di Sliwinski and Felicity Hawke were asked to be part of the steering group which shaped the course
- MU Facilitators ran the course primarily in Warwickshire alongside the Teenage Pregnancy Partnership

- By 2014, funding cuts meant that the course was no longer resourced by local councils
- In March 2016, Coventry Mothers' Union acquired ownership of the course from Coventry City Council, and revised and reprinted it


Our speaker Mrs Mary Beal spoke to us on MU Overseas. Mrs Beal and her family had spent 9 years in Uganda and was well aware of the needs of our members overseas. An electric light bulb would cost £4 and a gallon of petrol £30, a new tyre £100. Families were large – six children was a small family, many had 15 children or more. They needed our prayers and help. A Bring and Buy was held for Overseas Work and a grand total of £14.54 was handed to Mrs Beal.

Isobel Mold gave a very interesting talk on the Overseas Department. We were all surprised at how much work is done by Mothers' Union and the sums of money raised for transport, medicine and education, it certainly makes one proud to be a member of such a worldwide organisation.



Margaret Hall, Zambia

- Tailoring School built in Central Zambia and named for Margaret Weijnberg, whose husband built it
- Over many years MU supplied sewing machines and materials, often through TWAM (Tools with a Mission)
- In 2009 Felicity Hawke visited
 Margaret Hall and was shown how teaching sewing skills to young girls helps them to earn a living





- In 1927, there was a deputation to the Home Secretary asking to raise the marriage age from 12 for girls and 14 for boys to 16
- Members have often been asked for their views on marriage reform and divorce, abortion and sex education
- They have also campaigned on family allowance, working mothers and the welfare of children in hospital
- Recent campaigns focused on flexible working, the commercialisation of childhood, debt relief for developing countries and modern day slavery
- Currently focusing on domestic violence

Wilmcote 1952

Mrs Bingeman had received a letter from Mrs Kemp, suggesting we should write to the BBC asking for change of time of the programme "Hello There" held at 9.30 a.m. Sundays, as it was thought this programme interfered with children attending Sunday School. It was agreed to do so.

The magazine *Honey* came in for criticism - it was suggested by Mrs Carnegy as being a good girls' paper but it has shocked some people

March 1962

Long Itchington 1986

The speaker was John Watkins talking about "How Computers affect our lives". It was as Mrs Marriott said most enlightening. Mr Watkins said in an ordinary working day how the Computer affected us, starting with the weather forecast then our post, credit cards and even a visit to the local supermarket, all these were affected by the Computer. Mr Watkins did not think it took over our jobs but in fact in many cases improved working conditions. A most interesting evening.

Members have also offered help and support

The year began with a group of children from Wood End in Coventry visiting us here at St Giles [Exhall]. They had come for their annual treat to enjoy watching our local Pantomime.

During the summer holidays 3 MU branches including our own entertained a group of children from the Edgwick Centre in Foleshill. We opened up our Church Hall and provided entertainment in the adjacent park, games in the hall and finally a well-supplied table of eats!



1996

Many local events were also held, and discussions arranged about how to attract and support families. "How to be witnesses and not be repelling, interfering, criticising?" There were children's missions, garden parties, parents' evenings and a Home and Family Week.


Away From It All – holidays and days out for

A family selected for AFIA told me of their thoughts, all they wanted was emulsion and a couple of rolls of wallpaper for their living room and hall. I saw the completed living room transformed — a needy family supported by MU.

A Christmas present of a marmalade mincer was given to the Vicar and Mrs Churchill, who sincerely thanked all members

1980

A party for members and their husbands was held at the vicarage on Wednesday 6th February. Members and husbands were welcomed with a glass of sherry. A game of "Mr and Mrs" caused quite a lot of fun and laughter. Delicious eats were served followed by more games. A most enjoyable evening was had by all, with grateful thanks to the Vicar and Mrs Marriott
